

# IMAGIN as Implementation Support Agency under Jal Jeevan Mission: Learnings from District-Level Implementation

(Supported by the Department of Drinking Water & Sanitation, Ministry of Jal Shakti, Government of India, and the Public Health Engineering Department, Government of West Bengal)



Across Nadia, Murshidabad, Birbhum, and North 24 Parganas, IMAGIN worked as the Implementation Support Agency (ISA) under the Jal Jeevan Mission, adapting a common system-strengthening approach to varied district realities.

While each district presented distinct challenges—institutional capacity gaps, community leadership needs, water quality risks, and behaviour change priorities—the core strategy remained consistent: strong local institutions, informed communities, and shared ownership.



## What Worked: Key Learnings from the Field

### 1. Institutions Drive Sustainability

Strengthening Village Water & Sanitation Committees (VWSCs) and Gram Panchayat-level systems proved critical for translating infrastructure into functional services.

801 Gram Panchayats supported  
801 VWSCs revitalised and trained



### 2. Women's Leadership Strengthens Vigilance

Women-led platforms emerged as effective mechanisms for community vigilance, behaviour change, and accountability.

3,076 Jal Bachao Committees formed

### 3. Youth as Behaviour Change Catalysts

School-based engagement created long-term stewardship for water conservation and responsible usage.

## 4. Water Quality Requires Community Ownership

In districts with water quality challenges, awareness, testing, and transparent reporting at GP level significantly improved public confidence and safe water practices.

### The IMAGIN ISA Model

IMAGIN's experience demonstrates that Jal Jeevan Mission outcomes are strongest when infrastructure is matched with governance, leadership, and behaviour change.

As an ISA, IMAGIN functioned as a system enabler—strengthening public institutions, mobilising communities, and embedding sustainability at the grassroots.



# West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP) – Nadia District: IMAGIN as Support Organization (SO)

Supported by the West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP), funded by the World Bank, and the Department of Water Resources Investigation & Development, Government of West Bengal

During 2024-25, IMAGIN served as Support Organization under WBADMIP in Murshidabad District, empowering farming communities in groundwater-stressed regions through participatory irrigation management.

**Strengthening Water User Associations (WUAs):** IMAGIN supported the institutional development and functioning of Water User Associations to ensure participatory governance and long-term sustainability of irrigation schemes.

# West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP) – Murshidabad District: IMAGIN as Support Organization (SO)

Supported by the West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP), funded by the World Bank, and the Department of Water Resources Investigation & Development, Government of West Bengal

During 2024–25, IMAGIN commenced its role as Support Organization (SO) under WBADMIP in Murshidabad District, focusing on strengthening community-led minor irrigation systems in groundwater-stressed areas. The intervention aligned with WBADMIP's objective of improving agricultural productivity, livelihood resilience, and sustainable water resource management for small and marginal farmers.

**Strengthening Water User Associations (WUAs):** IMAGIN supported the institutional development and functioning of Water User Associations to ensure participatory governance and long-term sustainability of irrigation schemes.



# IMAGIN's Learnings as Support Organization under WBADMIP



- During 2024–25, IMAGIN's experience as Support Organization (SO) under the West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP) in Murshidabad and Nadia highlighted how institutional strength, capacity building, and convergence together ensure sustainable irrigation outcomes.
- A key learning was that strong Water User Associations (WUAs) are central to scheme sustainability. Continuous handholding, democratic functioning, financial discipline, and regular meetings strengthened ownership and accountability among farmers.



- Linking irrigation management with livelihood-focused capacity building—including water-efficient agriculture, crop planning, soil health, fisheries, and horticulture—significantly enhanced farm productivity and income resilience in groundwater-stressed areas.
- IMAGIN's application of participatory tools such as Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA), group discussions, field demonstrations, and peer learning proved effective in promoting behavioural change and collective responsibility.
- Equally important was convergence with line departments, enabling farmers to access technical support, government schemes, and market-linked opportunities. IMAGIN's WBADMIP experience reinforces that community-led irrigation systems succeed when governance, livelihoods, and convergence are addressed together, extending impact beyond infrastructure investments.

# Community Youth Reporters Programme: Amplifying Youth Voices for Social Change

In Murshidabad, young voices are emerging as powerful narrators of community realities through the Community Youth Reporters Programme. Designed by UNICEF in partnership with IMAGIN and the Press Club, Kolkata, the initiative empowers adolescents and youth to document, analyse, and report on issues that shape everyday life in their communities.

## • Building Young Community Journalists

The programme nurtures youth as community reporters, enabling them to observe, question, and tell stories rooted in lived experience.

- Structured training on storytelling, ethics, and reporting skills
- Continuous mentoring by IMAGIN coordinators and media professionals
- Field-based learning and peer-to-peer engagement
- Editorial guidance to strengthen clarity, confidence, and social perspective

## • Community Impact

The initiative has strengthened youth advocacy and community journalism, particularly in Murshidabad, positioning young people as visible stakeholders in local development processes.

- 50 youth-led stories developed (water, health, education, social inclusion)
- 4,500+ students reached through peer-led storytelling
- 5 schools engaged through outreach and sharing platforms



The programme fosters confidence, civic awareness, and responsible citizenship, ensuring that community voices—especially youth voices—are heard, valued, and acted upon.



# Advancing Gender Leadership in Community WASH

During 2024–25, IMAGIN advanced gender-inclusive development by positioning women as leaders in community-led WASH initiatives. A key milestone was the International Women's Day programme, organised with students of Dhubulia Girls Change High School, Nadia, and hosted at the Dhubulia BDO Office, where women, students, and community representatives engaged in dialogue on water, hygiene, public health, and equitable access, reinforcing women's roles as active decision-makers in local water governance.

# Empowering Women Through Community Mobilisation

During 2024–25, IMAGIN strengthened women's leadership at the grassroots by placing gender empowerment at the centre of its WASH and Jal Jeevan Mission interventions. Through sustained engagement with women's collectives, frontline workers, and local institutions, IMAGIN promoted women as active leaders and influencers in water governance and community well-being. A key milestone in this ongoing effort was a community rally organised on International Water Day at Barasat-I Gram Panchayat, Nadia. The event brought together women from diverse platforms to collectively raise voices on safe drinking water, household hygiene, equitable access to services, and responsible water use.

# Water Clubs: Building a New Generation of Water Leaders



IMAGIN strengthened youth-led water stewardship by establishing Water Clubs in schools across Nadia and Murshidabad. These student platforms nurture awareness, leadership, and practical skills around safe drinking water, conservation, and responsible water use.



- **What Water Clubs Do:**
  - **Build Awareness & Leadership**

- Understanding water conservation and sustainability
- Promoting safe household water practices
- Encouraging student leadership and peer learning

- **Develop Practical Skills**

- Hands-on water quality testing
- Basic water treatment awareness
- School-level water conservation actions

Through structured sessions, demonstrations, and group activities, Water Club members act as peer educators, extending learning beyond classrooms into families and neighbourhoods. Water Clubs have contributed to:

- Improved water practices within schools
- Increased awareness at household and community levels
- Youth emerging as local water champions



By placing responsibility and knowledge in young hands, IMAGIN is shaping a generation that understands water not just as a resource, but as a shared responsibility

# Empowering Young Voices for a Water-Secure Future



During 2024–25, IMAGIN strengthened sustained youth engagement to build leadership and awareness on water security, climate change, and environmental sustainability. A key milestone in this ongoing effort was the Youth Voicesinitiative, organised on World Water Day 2025 at Holy Family School, Farakka, Murshidabad. Students living along the Ganges shared insights on glacier melt, river flow changes, and future water risks through creative and analytical expressions.



# Functional Assessment of Functional Household Tap Connections (FHTCs)

## Jal Jeevan Mission – West Bengal



Supported by the Public Health Engineering Department, Government of West Bengal

IMAGIN successfully completed a large-scale Functional Assessment of Functional Household Tap Connections (FHTCs) under the Jal Jeevan Mission across Nadia, Birbhum, Murshidabad, and North 24 Parganas districts. The assessment played a critical role in strengthening last-mile service delivery and supporting evidence-based decision-making.

The process adopted Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) and Interpersonal Communication (IPC) tools, combining community meetings, village-level consultations, and door-to-door household visits. This community-centric approach ensured that ground realities were captured beyond routine infrastructure reporting.



During the reporting period, IMAGIN's field teams visited and consulted approximately 26.5 lakh households, assessing key parameters such as availability, water quality, pressure, and regularity of supply. The data collected was systematically digitised and uploaded, creating a robust evidence base for programme review.



The assessment enabled identification of specific gaps in rural piped water supply schemes, including operational, infrastructure, and usage-related issues. These findings were formally communicated to the Public Health Engineering Department, contributing to targeted corrective actions and service improvements. This assignment significantly strengthened community voice in monitoring processes and supported Jal Jeevan Mission's goal of sustainable, functional household-level water security.

# Impact



## Women on Vigil: Jal Bachao Committee in Action

In Purandar Pur Village, a vulnerable habitation of Murshidabad district, a women-led Jal Bachao Committee emerged as a frontline institution for community vigilance. Supported by IMAGIN, the committee brought together women—many SHG members—who directly experienced irregular supply, leakages, and unsafe water handling.

Capacity-building sessions enabled members to identify system gaps, promote safe water practices, and communicate effectively with VWSCs and Gram Panchayat representatives. The women began monitoring household connections, reporting leakages, discouraging wastage, and spreading awareness on hygienic storage.

Beyond technical vigilance, the committee became a platform for women's leadership, confidence, and collective voice—earning recognition as a trusted local institution.

# Impact



## Adibasi Women Led Water User Association Driving Agricultural Resilience

Under the West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP), IMAGIN supported a Water User Association managing a community irrigation scheme in groundwater-stressed Nabagram area of Murshidabad. Initially, participation was low, records were weak, and responsibilities were poorly understood.

IMAGIN focused on institutional strengthening—regular meetings, democratic decision-making, transparent financial management, and training on operation and maintenance. Farmers also received agriculture and water-efficiency trainings aligned with irrigation planning.

Gradually, coordination improved, participation increased, and farmers began collectively planning water use and crops. The WUA now functions as a confident, self-managed institution supporting agricultural livelihoods.

IMAGIN strengthened youth-led water stewardship by establishing Water Clubs in schools across Nadia and Murshidabad. These student platforms nurture awareness, leadership, and practical skills around safe drinking water, conservation, and responsible water use.

When IMAGIN began its intervention in Dkheka Gram Panchayat, the Village Water & Sanitation Committee (VWSC) existed largely on paper. Roles were unclear, meetings were irregular, and community trust in the piped water system remained weak despite infrastructure investments under the Jal Jeevan Mission.

Through structured handholding, IMAGIN supported reconstitution of the VWSC, clarified institutional responsibilities, and facilitated regular meetings integrated with Gram Sabha processes. Members received training on operation and maintenance planning, grievance redressal, and community contribution mechanisms. Women's participation was actively encouraged, strengthening transparency and accountability at the ground level.

Within months, the VWSC transitioned into a functional local institution—maintaining records, resolving service disruptions, and proactively engaging households. The Gram Panchayat began working actively at the field level, strengthening community confidence in the drinking water system. Water-related discussions became a regular agenda within Gram Panchayat meetings and local decision-making.



“Earlier, water supply was seen only as a departmental responsibility. Today, our VWSC understands that sustainability starts with us. IMAGIN helped us turn responsibility into collective action.”
